



What is a Systematic Review?


 A specific, rigorous and reproducible summary of all the researched evidence that relates to a specific question.



Evidence of Gap

- Consistent evidence of failure to translate research findings into clinical practice
 - 30-40% patients do not get treatments of proven effectiveness
 - 20-25% patients get care that is not needed or potentially harmful

Why do Systematic Reviews?


- Amount of evidence available







- Web searching




Quality Assessment of Primary Studies

- Selection bias
- Allocation bias
- Confounders
- Blinding

- Data collection methods
- Withdrawals and drop-outs
- Analysis
- Intervention integrity


Data Extraction and Synthesis

What is a Meta-Analysis?

- Combines the results of similar studies quantitatively.
- Produces a summary statistic that represents the effect of the intervention (from several different studies combined).
- Summary statistic is more precise than the effect size from individual studies
- Meta-analysis should only proceed from systematic reviews, but not all systematic reviews should be meta-analyses!



Review: Telephone counselling for smoking cessation


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Problems and Limitations of Systematic Reviews


- Lack of high quality studies
 - What happens when a review finds no good evidence?
- Lack of information about potential harmful effects, costs
- Narrow questions
- Role of values: systematic reviews are not designed to make decisions, simply to assist in making them



Unique Challenges in Population / Public Health

The role of meta-analysis:

- Clinical heterogeneity
- Multiple interventions
- Multiple outcomes
- Statistical heterogeneity



Unique Challenges in Population / Public Health

How to decide which designs to include:

- RCTs
- Observational Studies
- Case-Control
- Before/After Studies
- Qualitative Designs
- Uncontrolled



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


